Message from our Pastor

Dear Members and Friends,

A few days ago, I came across a news story of WWII Japanese internment camp survivors staging a peaceful protest at an immigrant detention facility on the Texas border. More than 60 people of Japanese American ancestry, many of whom were either internees themselves or descendants of internees, were protesting the family separation policy under the Trump administration.

Many others who could not be at the protest site contributed by making origami paper cranes, a Japanese symbol of hope and peace. The organizers were hoping to receive 10,000 paper cranes to hang on the fence of the detention facility. They received more than double that number. The peaceful protestors were not only calling attention to the current immigration crisis on the southern border, but also calling on people not to repeat the painful historical events of family separation and detention that people of Japanese ancestry endured during WWII. It was a reminder of my own family's struggles during the war.

After the bombing of Pearl Harbor, in the midst of wartime hysteria, my father, Masami, had been arrested and imprisoned by the United States government along with thousands of other people of Japanese ancestry. He was 22 years old. My father's older brother, Tsuyoshi, was a private serving in the United States Army.

I found an old letter dated October 28, 1943, written by Tsuyoshi while he was on the battlefield, fighting the Nazis in the mountains of Italy. Tsuyoshi wrote this letter to his younger brother, after just having learned about my father's arrest and internment.

Despite battling his own fears of an imminent enemy attack, Tsuyoshi wrote, "Brother, I heard you were arrested. God knows you did nothing wrong... I pray for you everyday... God bless you... Your

brother, Tsuyoshi."

Just a few days later, Tsuyoshi was killed by a bomb blast. To me this letter symbolizes an older brother's love and encouragement for his younger brother as both faced extreme adversity. But more importantly, it's a sacred letter of God's presence during times of hardship and despair.

God hears the voices of all those who suffer. God suffers along with us.

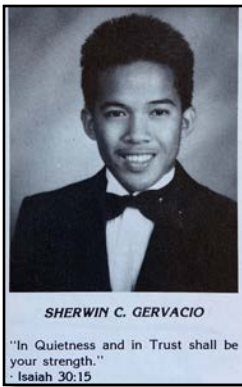

History of Sherwin Gervacio Golf Tourney by Jason Agsalda

Sherwin Gervacio was a member of the Waialua United Church of Christ. He graduated from Waialua High and Intermediate School in 1991 where he was an outstanding student athlete. There he starred as a runner on the Track and Cross Country teams. Academically, he maintained a high GPA and was also a part of many clubs, committees and held leadership positions at the school. After graduating, he attended the University of Hawaii at Manoa and majored in Civil Engineering. Sherwin studied hard and despite being busy in school he would always make the trek home to Waialua to attend church, sometimes even riding his bike back! During his Junior year, Sherwin was diagnosed with spinal meningitis and within a few days, he suddenly passed away. Everyone in the community and church was saddened because we lost someone who had a lot of hope and promise to do something great in life.

His impact was far greater than his achievements in athletics and school as he was also a member of our youth group.

Sherwin faithfully served God and influenced the younger youth at the time including myself to do well in school, respect our elders and to always follow God's plan. To honor him, the church started a scholarship in his name in 1995; and since its inception, we have given over \$30,000 in scholarship money to deserving members pursuing higher education.

Personally, I always looked up to him because he was such a great person. He was always there for the rest of the youth group. I remember him always giving us rides to church, helping me with my math homework and just always being positive! So, chairing this event each year is an honor especially because I was one of the first recipients of this scholarship.

So, the Golf Tourney we do each year is in memory of him and his legacy. This year's 7th annual golf outing will be held at Moanalua Golf Club on Saturday, July 20, 2019. The tournament is open to members of the church, family and friends. The goal of the golf tournament is to raise money for the scholarship fund and mostly to provide a relaxing, enjoyable afternoon for those in attendance!

My Friendship with Virginia Basilio by Hanako Takahashi

My first encounter with Virginia was in 1961. Rev. Heidemi Tsutsui approached me to teach Sunday School at Waialua United Church of Christ. Being a total stranger among the WUCC members, I was warmly received by Virginia Basilio about 50 years ago. She was warm, friendly, kind, always smiling and welcomed me to her home. Sometimes, she would tell me to stay for dinner. We had a wonderful time sharing stories, over difficult and happy times, and laughter. She was a soft-spoken person who never yelled at her children. Even when Castor made her upset, she prayed about it and was able to maintain peace.

Virginia was faithful in bringing her children and grandchildren to Sunday School and church services. Virginia, who had a Vacation Bible School preschool class, brought Vanessa who was 2 years old to class. Vanessa loved to sing "Jesus Loves Me" and recite simple Bible verse.

I have seen her six children Joyce, Dave, Virgilio, Cecilia, Wayne, and Carol complete their education beyond high school. Two worked as teachers. Joyce and Cecilia - teachers; Virgilio - counselor/vice principal, Wayne - carpet/tile worker; Dave and Carol - accountant. I've attended their graduations and marriages.

The most memorable event was Melissa's graduation at Tulane University in New Orleans in 2003. The Basilio ohana invited me to join them. We stayed at the Sheraton, New Orleans. The first night (Friday) at the Sheraton, Virginia lost her balance after her granddaughter took over pushing Castor on a wheelchair.



Because she ended up with a hairline fracture on her left hip, she was hospitalized and was unable to attend Melissa's graduation ceremony at the SuperDome in New Orleans on Saturday. However, she joined us at the Michaul's restaurant on Sunday. Virginia never complained about her pain and discomfort. There were two wheelchairs (for Castor and Virginia) the remaining of the trip. They rode on a station wagon. There were three vans for a total of close to 30 people. We traveled to Orlando Florida to see the Disney World and stayed at the Hard Rock Hotel. Most of the time, Virginia and Castor being wheelchair bound, sat and waited for the rest of the family, who enjoyed the different rides.

Virginia was actively involved in church activities. She taught Sunday School and served as a Deacon and finance committee member. She made delicious potato salad and chicken adobo for potluck events. She also helped Carol make the manger scene out of white and blue material cutouts, which is displayed during the Christmas season. May it be well remembered.

Whenever I dropped by the Basilio's home, I looked forward to seeing Virginia in her reclining chair or on the couch. Now that she's gone, there's an emptiness, but I know that she's in a better place in paradise with Castor.

This scripture is applicable to Virginia who lived as a Christian woman: "Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in Love. Make every effort to keep the unity of the spirit - through the bond of peace." Ephesians 4:2-3

My Story is God's Story by Angel Calaro

If you didn't know already, my name is Angel Calaro. I'm the daughter of Juni and Rayna Calaro. I have been a part of Waialua United Church of Christ for 14 years. Growing up, I always attended Sunday School and Vacation Bible School with my siblings, cousins, and friends.

In May, I graduated from Waialua High and Intermediate School as one of the Valedictorians of the Class of 2019. I was the Senior Class Treasurer and was a part of student government for five years. I was also a member of the National Honor Society, as well as the President of the blood drive committee. I held a 4.0 to a 4.2 Grade Point Average and earned the Principal's List award all 4 years of high school.

When I think about my high school experience, there are many things that come to mind. Some of them are: good memories, bad memories, mistakes, lessons, happiness, heartbreak, misfortune, joy, drama, and most importantly, fun. High school flew by really fast, almost too fast sometimes. I learned many valuable life lessons as well as made lifelong friends. I learned the value of hard work, dedication, and also how to tell your real friends apart from the others. It was tough, but overall, a great experience that I will miss. If high school has taught me anything, it is that you should always have confidence in yourself. If you believe in yourself and you believe that you can achieve anything you want in life, good things will happen to you. I have set my eyes on going to college and having a career as an accountant. My original post high school plan was to attend the College of Southern Nevada and transfer to the University of Nevada Las Vegas. However, plans changed because I ended up getting pregnant in high school.

In life, we want to be the best, have the best of everything, and be surrounded by only the best people that can help us to achieve our desired goals. But as a Christian, it takes more than just wanting the best, you have to put forward the effort, and follow the path that God has set forth. Unfortunately, some things will get in your way, your faith can become tested, and your decision making can become clouded. You will probably ask yourself why? Why am I the one that seems to keep struggling?

On Sunday, February 3rd 2019, Dylan and I found out we were having a baby.

In only a moment, everything had changed. I was in complete shock and Dylan was speechless. I thought to myself, what am I gonna tell my parents? How will we break the news to family and friends? How will this affect the both of us? What will people think? What will they say? What about college and my future?

The very next day, I broke the news to my parents. I showed my mom the pregnancy tests and she broke down into tears. She left my room to tell my dad the news. He was furious. I will never forget the hurt I saw in their faces. Every hope and dream they had in me up until this moment changed. Although they were upset, angry, disappointed and more, they told Dylan and I they would be our number one supporters and guide us every step of the way. They told us to pray upon this situation and ask God for guidance and answers. Together, and privately, we shed thousands of tears and

prayed countless prayers. And though my parents assured me of their love, forgiveness, and support, I knew they were hurting. Our entire family was shaken, and life for us would never be the same again.

My parents often questioned their parenting skills. How could we have failed so miserably when we thought we had covered all the bases? Taught her all the right values? How could she have fallen so far short of the target?

The truth is the same people we are trying to please or impress have weaknesses, challenges, and trials of their own. Everyone makes mistakes. "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). No one is perfect.

With my parents' guidance, I grew a relationship with the Lord and began making better choices to please Him. My parents constantly supported and encouraged me through the challenges associated with teen pregnancy. We developed a plan: I would have to maintain my grades in school, complete my high school education as scheduled, graduate on time, and go on to college. We watched God work out all the details of my life, as I trusted in Him. With a lot of hard work, I was able to complete my senior year on time and graduate with my class.

Although my original post high school plan didn't work out, I chose to attend Leeward Community College and tomorrow, will be the start of my college journey where I will be working towards earning an associate in science degree in accounting. I will be getting a head start on my credits since I won't be able to attend college during the Fall semester since my due date is on October 5th. However, I plan to return to LCC during the Spring semester.

What we initially viewed as a tragedy, God used for our good and for His glory! It was a life-changing experience—one in which we all grew closer to the Lord and to each other. Through it all, He healed our hearts and showed us that we were not alone, that He is faithful, and that in all things, He has given us the victory.

I learned what it really means to trust God and to depend on Him completely.

No matter how far short of God's glory we may fall, God has provided a perfect Savior for us.

God showed us that His plans for my life are far better than our dreams could ever be. After all, He loves me perfectly, as only He can. His Word tells us in Psalm 139:16 that He saw me before I was born and scheduled each day of my life before I began to breathe. Every day was recorded in His book! We understand now that my life is right on track according to His will.

I would like to thank the man above for everything He has done for me so far. Had it not been for God, I wouldn't be here right now. He has given me the strength to push through high school and life, especially in times of discouragement.

As I continue to live through the ups and downs of life's journey, I often find myself smiling as I reflect on the truth that my life is more than perfect ... ALL THINGS WORK TOGETHER FOR GOOD FOR THOSE WHO LOVE GOD. (Romans 8:28)

We enjoyed the Bible stories, had fun memorizing Bible verses, and singing in the children's choir. We enjoyed celebrating Easter and Christmas with our new church family. It was a special time to be with our special friend Jesus Christ and to pray and sing praises

to Him. He is alive and active in our lives.

I was in the 8th grade when God revealed His truth to me on His words that I made the decision to place my trust in Him. I haven't stopped praising God and thanking Him for all the miracles He has been doing in my life and the many opportunities He has given me to experience Him every day in my life. Psalm 118:1 "Give thanks to the Lord for He is good. His love endures forever." He has blessed me with a loving family and friends and good health. our prayers knowing that the Lord has promised them, including all of us, plans for "a future and a hope."


