
Curious to know what else has changed in our church? I bet you are! From staffing changes and

THE TUESDAY MARKET NEWS

Can you believe that soon we will be celebrating the Tuesday Market's 2-year anniversary? It has been quite the journey for us all. We have met most every Tuesday for almost two years with regular team meetings. Most recently, we had the opportunity to reflect on the highs, the lows, and everything in-between. Through it all, we have had some very faithful volunteers who have helped us set up or break down the tents, tables, and equipment every week. They make sure the parking lot is clear and facilities are ready for our guests. We could not open our doors without them!

We have noticed that the market slowed considerably during the summer months, both last year and this year... especially this year. We decided that the market should take a break during the summer months. That means we will continue to meet on Tuesdays up to Memorial Day and resume in September on the first Tuesday on the week following Labor Day.

We also plan to maintain a consistent time of operation, 3-7 pm, throughout the year. We gave the first Friday of the month a trial period this summer but have decided to stay with just Tuesdays moving forward.

We are hoping to see our market pick up both in participating vendors and in foot traffic. We are always



in need of food vendors and farmers. If you know of any, please pass that information on to one of us. Meanwhile, we feel we have a minimum requirement for participating vendors and that number is now 12. That way, when 2 vendors cancel last minute on the day of the market and there is one no-show, we will still have a decent number of vendors for a respectable market. We do expect the market to pick up especially since summer vacations are over and the holiday months are approaching.

We would love to have 3 or 4 able bodied available members of the church help on Tuesdays on an everyother week basis. Many hands make light work and prevent burn out. If students can assist, we are able to give them credit for their service hours.





God is ever present and everywhere. Whether we gather in the church sanctuary or outdoors



on our sprawling green lawn, we are reminded of the presence of the Lord. It is with this mindset and vision of stewardship that the church grounds are lovingly tended to and maintained.

Throughout the years, the Yard Fellowship has provided the muscle and sweat equity to nurture and maintain the two plus acres of the Waialua United Church of Christ. The Yard Fellowship started many years ago with a handful of retired church members and continues to the present with a dedicated crew which includes Evelyn Miyata, Hanako Takahashi, Dolly Subia, Florida Subia, Dave Basilio, Rosemary Basilio, Laurie Oishi, Dale Andres, and Eddie Pedro.

In the past several years, much of grounds have been the transformed with the addition of new landscaping. Starting in October 2020, during the middle of the pandemic, the entrance area to the social hall from the existing parking lot was created into a welcoming portal with a mixture of tropical plants, rocks new and grass. Prior to that, the area



did not do justice in paying tribute to our generous donors, the Weinberg family, and welcoming people to the beautiful new facility as the starkness of the area did the opposite.

A year later, the courtyard area between the church entrance and the administration building was greatly enhanced with new palm trees and a variety of more tropical plantings. Towards the



end of 2021, manila palm trees generously donated by Renie Agsalda, were planted throughout the lawn between the church and the social hall and now give the grounds a resort feel. Other recent landscape improvements include planting new shrubbery along the social hall/preschool lanai areas, planting new grass and landscape behind the social hall office and kitchen, and new landscaping adjacent to the maintenance shed.

The planting and maintenance work continues and we welcome the helping hands and sweat equity of the church family as work dates and Tuesday Yard Fellowship are scheduled throughout the year. With only a handful of volunteers, their work allows the church family, visitors, Tuesday Market and social hall users to enjoy the beautiful landscape vistas that adorn the grounds. It is by being faithful and diligent in our work of stewardship that we offer up our praise for His excellent greatness.


