A message from our...



Greetings Waialua UCC!

...Pastor

We arrived on July 15th and have been doing our best to settle in: learning new routes, attempting to pronounce street names correctly, and doing our best not to eat too much local food – if you don't know by now, your pastor likes to eat. Our sense of

"home" is evolving daily, and we anticipate that God will continue to shape our hearts and minds. There is so much to learn yet, and we're excited to follow God in the process.

One way God is rooting us is through our new family – Waialua United Church of Christ. You guys! Oahu is our new home; you are our new family. My wife and I were humbled and felt loved and affirmed by your positive vote in April, and we now look forward to living into that. God has aligned our hearts, and I trust that together we can work alongside Him to build His Kingdom here in Waialua and beyond.

As I said in my first sermon as your pastor, "I desire to be like Paul and that Waialua UCC be like the Philippian church" – namely, that we enjoy and love one another. The apostle writes, "I thank my God every time I remember you. In all my prayers for all of you, I always pray with joy..." (Philippians 1:3-4). Just by the mere memory of the Philippian church, Paul's mind is rushed with affection. He was both thankful and joyful, and these affections were mutual. Why was this the case? He continues and writes, "for your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now" (Philippians 1:5). Since the beginning, the church and the apostle were on gospel mission together. This is my hope for us not a surface-level form of thankfulness and joy, but thankfulness and joy that emerge from our commitment to shared ministry. Amen?

We see through a later text that Paul was supported by the church while he was imprisoned. Unlike modern American prisons, food and clean clothing were not always provided, so the church would support Paul by frequenting the prison, bringing along basic necessities for him. It was a partnership that extended beyond the "four walls" of



the church and beyond the hour on Sunday. This is what I want for our church – not that I'll be in a prison dungeon (God forbid! But if I do, can someone bring me loco moco?) – but that our work, growth, and love extend beyond what we do here on Sunday mornings. While as a church family we have yet to learn and navigate what a mission partnership looks like for us, I hope we're excited to see what the Holy Spirit will reveal.

Waialua UCC, I'm excited to serve and lead you. Through conversations and my observations so far, I gather that Waialua is a special place. I pray that I continue to learn all its contours and history of both the town and our church. The song Waialua Sky (Hi, Uncle Edwin!) alludes to how simple things, like a little island rain, evoke wonderful memories of Waialua. I hope and pray that through our shared ministry our church adds to what makes Waialua as a whole special. Let's go!



A NEW CREATION

¹⁸Jesus came and told his disciples, "I have been given all authority in heaven and on earth. ¹⁹Therefore, go and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit."

Matthew 28:18-19 (NLT)

On Sunday, 30 June 2024, I got baptized in the powerful and mighty name of Jesus. Furthermore, I have received and surrendered prayer more than I have ever experienced in my life. God moved through Pastor Makoa Galletes and his family, as well as their friends JayJay and Keora to fulfill Jesus' command in Matthew 28:18-19.

According to Blue Letter Bible, there are three different translated definitions of the word "baptize" from Greek to English:

- I. to dip repeatedly, to immerse, to submerge (of vessels sunk)
- II. to cleanse by dipping or submerging, to wash, to make clean with water, to wash one's self, bathe
- III. to overwhelm

¹⁷Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; old things have passed away; behold, all things have become new.

2 Corinthians 5:17 (NKJV)

¹²Having been buried with him in baptism, in which you were also raise with him through your faith in the working of God, who raise him from the dead.

Colossians 2:12 (NIV)

Baptism is a public declaration that one has died to their old self and old ways, and through Jesus has been made new. The act of submerging one in a body of water represents dying with Christ. Moreover, the act of emerging from the water represents being raised up to new life in Christ as such in the resurrection.

The trials and temptations don't magically disappear when one decides to surrender their life to Christ. But it is because of stepping into authority and a new identity that one carries themself in the power of the mighty name of Jesus. If you are a follower of Christ, the enemy has no power or stronghold over your life and you need to know it!

¹¹The Spirit of God, who raised Jesus from the dead, lives in you. And just as God raise Jesus Christ from the dead, he will give life to your mortal bodies by the same Spirit living within you.

Romans 8:11 (NLT)

Dear Heavenly Father, I pray for the people reading this message right now that they may invite you in their heart. Jesus, I pray they would surrender their whole life to you... not a little bit, or a half, but their whole life. I pray they would see you and know who you really are, Lord.
